

# Homecoming Fete Opens Friday

## New All Time Record Set By Enrollment

The all-time high in enrollment gains reached here last year has been eclipsed by this semester's student body. The Rev. William J. Cracknell, C. S. V., Registrar, made known last week that, while complete statistics are not yet available, the increase is in the neighborhood of 30 per cent.

The most notable gains were made in the Senior and Sophomore classes. To date, more than three times as many Seniors are registered than were graduated last June, and the Sophomore class boasts a 25 per cent growth. The Freshman gained only 5 per cent over last year's large class, while the Junior class remains unchanged.

### Social Activity Planned

The educational advantages offered by St. Viator College have drawn increasing numbers to the Bourbonnais camps during the past four years. The 1935 enrollment figures stood 25 per cent higher than those for the preceding year.

While drawing up the social calendar last week, George Rogers, '37, College Club President, encountered numerous difficulties in working out arrangements for the growing number of local organizations. He insisted that the College Club will promote a greater amount of social activities than in the past.

## Juniors Give Straub Second Term

Frank Straub, outstanding athlete, was re-elected president of the Junior Class at a meeting in Marsile Hall on September 30. The action of the members of the class of '38 breaks an old tradition of the college in as much as the same man has never before been returned to a class presidency.

Straub, a native of Bloomington, has proved one of the outstanding leaders upon the campus during his past two years of residence. Besides holding the office of president of the Junior Class, Frank is also the vice-president of the College Club, most prominent organization of St. Viator College.

Francis Sanhuber, Milwaukee, Wis., was named for the vice-presidency of the class. John Stevens, football star, secured the secretaryship while Gene Larkin was elected treasurer. Stevens hails from Springfield, Ill., and Larkin calls Towanda, Ill., his hometown.

## Holy Father Praises Dr. Cardinal's Book

His Holiness, Pope Pius XI, has recently given recognition to the Very Rev. Dr. E. V. Cardinal, C. S. V., president of the college, for his latest valuable historical volume "Cardinal Lorenzo Campeggio".

Cardinal Campeggio was Papal Legate to a large number of important gatherings in the early days of the sixteenth century when the storm of Protestantism was breaking over Europe. Dr. Cardinal's material was gathered chiefly from original documents found in the Vatican archives and in the great libraries of Bologna, Paris and London. He also had access to the papers of the Campeggio family. The book contains 200 pages and is published by Chapman and Grimes, Boston.

## Add Nine Teachers St. Viator Staff

Father Phillips Resumes Post of Dean of Studies

In order to meet growing demands of an increasing student body, nine instructors have been added to the faculty of the college for the current scholastic year. Seven of these are members of the Clerics of St. Viator, four priests and three brothers, while the remaining two are laymen who have previously taught at the University of Illinois.

The Rev. Leo T. Phillips, C.S.V., who during a leave of absence for the year 1935-36 completed his work for the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Latin at the Catholic University of America, has resumed the chair of Dean of Studies. Dr. Phillips will also teach certain of the advanced Latin courses.

The Rev. Dr. W. Bergin, C. S. V., president of the college during the two years after the World War, has been recalled from his post at the University of Illinois and will head the Philosophy department of the college. Father Bergin has been connected with St. Viator college since January of 1927 and during that time he has filled the various offices of director of seminarians, dean of men, and head of the philosophy department, besides introducing many extra curricular activities for the students.

### U. of I. Men

Dr. Gilbert Kinzer has been engaged as the new director of the combined department of Mathematics, Physics, and Engineering. Dr. Kinzer holds the degrees of B. S., M. S., and Ph. D. from the University of Illinois. Since 1931 Dr. Kinzer has been a member of the faculty of the University of Illinois as an instructor in the Department of Physics. A new professor of Ac-

# Improvements Greet Eyes Of Viator's Returning Sons

## Library Facilities are Greatly Improved; New Quarters House Departments.

Through the untiring efforts of department heads, notable improvements have been made in the college buildings during the past summer.

Very Rev. Dr. E. V. Cardinal, C. S. V., president, acting in co-operation with the Rev. F. E. Munsch, C. S. V., Librarian, largely deserves the credit for the expansion of the college library which now occupies the entire second floor of Marsile Hall. The spacious and well-lighted center room, formerly the stack room has been converted into the reading room. The new quarters are decorated in peach with silver and brown trim, and the floor is finished in natural oak. The windows are equipped with Venetian blinds, and indirect lighting has been in-

stalled. The walls are lined with built-in book cases which contain reference work for use only in the library. Within a short time it is also planned to equip the reading room with new tables and chairs.

The north room, formerly occupied by the Biology department, is now a stack room, and the south room, formerly the reading room, is a seminar room. Here also it is planned to hold meetings of the International Relations Club.

The new arrangement of the library provides an entrance to the library from either stairway. The work done this summer climaxes a program of modernization and expansion begun two years ago when Father Munsch was appointed head librarian.

### Biology Laboratory Moved

The Chemistry department was also decorated and modernized during the summer months. The two laboratories and the lecture room are painted ivory and trimmed in light grey. The Rev. Eugene F. Hoffman, C. S. V., a new addition to this year's faculty, was instrumental in bringing about the improvements in this department.

The Biology laboratory, formerly located on the second floor of Marsile Hall, was moved to newly decorated quarters on the third floor.

The redecoration of Roy Hall, begun in September of 1935, was also completed with the painting of the second, third and fourth corridors and the front stairway. Several classrooms of Marsile Hall were likewise painted.

## Wave Win Opener: Then Lose Second Tilt

### Irish Shine In Initial Fray As Ferris Falls, 26-0

Captain Gibbons Sets Pace For New Men

The Green Wave of St. Viator rolled over a band of sturdy but outclassed gridmen from Ferris Institute, Big Rapids, Michigan, for their initial victory of the season at Alumni Field in Kankakee by a 26-0 count. The Irish made several long drives in the first half only to lose the ball each time they neared the Maroon goal line. In the second half, things took on a different complexion and the Irish recorded 26 points on two touchdowns by Captain Tom Gibbons, one each by Danny Blazeovich and "Buzz" Romary, and conversions by Saia and Gibbons.

Viator took the kickoff and advanced to the Ferris 9 yard marker on runs by Lenahan and Gibbons and a pass from Walsh to Blazeovich. After losing the ball on downs, Viator was given a scare when Ferris completed a pass on the Irish 34 yard stripe, but Bill Walsh, scrappy junior safety man, pulled Campbell down and ended the Ferris threat. Twice more the Macmen carried the oval close to the invaders goal line where stubborn resistance prevented any scoring.

In the third quarter the proteges of Bill MacElwain, former Northwestern University captain and Chicago Cardinals end, were swamped by a Viator attack that would not be denied. Tom Gibbons drove through from the one yard stripe, added the extra point by placement, and a few moments later scored again on a 4 yard pass from Bill Walsh. The conversion attempt failed.

#### Blazeovich Scores

Early in the third period Romary passed to Dan Blazeovich, who took the pigskin on his 48 yard line, reversed his field, and behind excellent blocking, ran 52 yards for another score. Joe Saia, veteran back who has been converted into a guard, kicked the extra point. The final Irish score came when Buzz Romary took Girocco's punt on the Green Wave 26 and stopped, reversed his field and waited for his interference to form, then stepped off 74 yards for the longest run of the game. Don Betourne's attempt at placement was wide.

The Green Wave showed improvement over teams of recent years in blocking ability and in team spirit. The squad, however, lacks experience and for this reason may find difficulties before the end of the season. Viator partisans are nevertheless predicting a successful season.

### Bearcats Claw Saints Into First Defeat, 13 to 6

Blazeovich Stars As Irish Suffer Amazing Loss On Road Trip

Whirl-wind like passing attack, coupled with some marvelous running that brought the Irish gridders a total yardage gain of 364 yards to the Maryville's 194 yards, 25 first downs to 8; all went for nothing as the breaks of the game continually went against the Green Wave last Friday night at Maryville, Missouri. The final score was Maryville, 13; St. Viator, 6.

Time after time when it seemed certain that Lady Luck had at last turned her face to the Irish a fumble or an intercepted pass would change the complexion of the game.

#### Maryville Scores

Starting out in a smashing attack, the Viator team seemed certain of scoring in the early minutes of the game. Maryville received the kick-off and after a few futile attempts to gain kicked deep into the Viator territory. A beautiful running attack, with plenty of passes mixed in, brought the Irish within scoring position. Lady Luck frowned though and Walsh's pass intended for rGibbons was intercepted by Richards. On the next play Roulon raced 60 yards to the Viator 4. A pass, Roulon to Zuchowski, bounced off of Morenc's hands as he tried to knock it down. Zuchowski caught it for the touchdown. Extra point try was wide. The touchdown came after 12 minutes of play had elapsed.

In the second quarter Captain Gibbons recovered a fumble on the Maryville 40. A sustained drive, which saw Blazeovich catching innumerable passes brought the ball to the Maryville 6. On a spinner play Walsh crashed over for the touchdown that tied the score. Gibbons' try for the extra point was low and wide. Viator again threatened in the closing minutes of the first half, taking the ball to the 4 yard stripe. A pass into the end zone was incomplete and Maryville punted out of danger as the half ended.

#### Bearcats Score Again

The final half saw many passes featuring the Viator attack. Gibbons and Blazeovich being the main men on the receiving end of all of Walsh's tosses. One of Walsh's passes was intercepted by Roulon and run back to the Viator 17. Roulon scored after two running plays, going over on a plunge from the six yard stripe. Roulon's kick was good. Viator threatened twice in the later stages of the game.

Statistics of the game show that the Irish of Bourbonnais outgained their opponents. Viator made 204 yards from scrimmage to the Bearcats' 174; made 160 yards on passes to 25 yards; and compiled 25 first downs to 8. The Missourians, however, scored 13 points to 6 and since they pay off on points and not touchdowns, the Green Wave has racked up it's first defeat of the season.

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## A CHALLENGE TO CATHOLICISM

Philosophical and political sophistry knocks today at the door of the Man in White in Rome, and asks if he is ready to surrender, just as it has done for centuries. And as the Man in White meets his adversaries with stern yet forgiving eyes, the leaders of nations fling down their challenge — a challenge as old as history, trimmed in gilded design.

You are too old; your usefulness is gone; your work is finished, is the charge leveled at the Church from Communistic Russia, Fascist Germany, and revolution-torn Spain — a charge which also echoes in other nations of the western world. As the aged Pontiff looks out on a changing world, arguments which anti-date modern history are paraded before him, their rotten cores covered with tinsel trappings.

He is told that the Church is corrupt; her clergy, avaricious and pleasure-loving. He hears that Christian doctrine stands in the way of progress. The people must go up, up, up into the clouds of Utopia; but papal definitions and anathemas hold back their emancipation. The unfit must be eliminated; the weak must be prevented from propagating the race. Only the strong must prevail. Total equality is the solution to world problems, and the state must be supreme.

A shadow passes over the brow of the Man in White. He sees blood and sorrow and sacrifice as a Universal Church fights back the advance of a totalitarian state. He hears the lament of wives and the cry of children as political leaders teach their philosophy with musket and sabre.

Yet the Man in White cannot despair. His feet rest on eternal adamant, and his heart is warmed by the words, "Lo! I am with you, even unto the consummation of the world". He is not new to the demands of modern thought. His predecessors heard them centuries before today's reformers. Nor is he new to the warfare against prejudice and anti-religious power. The Church began its crusade for Christianity 20 centuries ago, and its enemies have always been the same. And as the Man in White turns from the threatening leaders and closes his door against them, the answer to the challenge is flashed from the battlements of Christendom to a waiting world: "The battle for Christ goes on."
