## ANNUAL HOMECOMING TAKES PLACE TODAY

### Father O'Mahoney Made Provincial

At the close of the Annual Retreat of the Clerics of St. Viator last June, the Very Rev. F. M. Roberge, C. S. V., Superior General, announced the appointment of the Very Rev. John P. O'Mahoney, C. S. V., to the Provincialship of the Viatorians in the United States.

#### Former President of St. Viator College

That Father O'Mahoney is capable of fulfilling the duties of his new position is the firm conviction of all who know him. His work as president of St. Viator College whilst yet in his thirties was most remarkable. Besides bringing the college through the crisis of the fire in 1906, he re-adjusted the curriculum of studies to conform to the most exacting standards of the various accrediting boards.

#### Other Achievements.

Father O'Mahoney's labors were not confined within the walls of St. Viator College. As a charter member of the Catholic Education Association, and later as Secretary and President of that organization, he was instrumental in raising the standard of our Catholic schools.

After serving as President of St. Viator's, Father O'Mahoney was pastor of St. Viator's Church in Chicago for two years, and was then sent to Columbus College, Chamberlain, S. D., where he displayed unusual ability as a professor in the seminary department. The following year he suffered a severe attack of illness; his condition was grave for almost a year, but with rest and medical attention his health was finally restored.

#### Endows the College.

He returned to St. Viator College where he served as treasurer for four years. In 1925 he became very active in directing the work of the Alumni association. Then in the spring of 1926 he set out on the tremendous work of endowing St. Viator College, and up to date has been most successful in this undertaking.

#### Well-qualified for Office.

Father O'Mahoney is well qualified for the office now given him. His generous self-sacrifice in the cause of Catholic Education and his unquenchable zeal for the welfare of the Clerics of St. Viator have repeatedly proven this. Those who know him, and especially his fellow Viatorians, are aware of his loyal and unstinted devotion to the welfare of Catholic youth. The spiritual and intellectual progress of the Community are safe in his hands, while his financial abilities insure the material success of his administration.

### Superior General

#### Visits at College

Shortly after school was out last week, the Very Rev. F. M. Roberge, C. S. V., Superior General of the Clerics of St. Viator, arrived in Bourbonnais for his Canonical Visit. Father Roberge stayed in this vicinity about two weeks, visiting the neighboring parishes of the Community, and presiding at the Annual Retreat. While in Bourbonnais, Father Roberge was the guest of Father Surprenant, the Provincial. It was during his visit here that he announced the appointment of the new Provincial, Father O'Mahoney.

### Community Loses Beloved Priest

#### Father Mulvaney Dies Suddenly

The Reverend George P. Mulvaney, C.S.V., Ph. D., LL.D., former professor of philosophy at St. Viator College, died August 30 at St. Edward's rectory in Chicago. For the past six years Father Mulvaney has been a member of the faculty of Incarnate Word College, San Antonio, Texas, and was preparing to return to his duties in the South when he was stricken.

#### Death Sudden

Although Father Mulvaney has been in poor health for some time his death was unlooked for, and was attributed to a heart attack. Father Mulvaney had returned from a visit with his mother in Milwaukee late in the evening of August 28. He arose early August 30, gave communion to the Sisters and returned to his room, where he rested during the day. Shortly before midnight Father Corbett, C.S.V., rector of St. Edward's, in passing his room, heard him utter the words "Jesus, Mary and Joseph, help." Failing to hear a response to his call, Father Corbett forced the door of the room and discovered his confrere lying prostrate across the room. Father O'Mahoney, the Provincial, administered Extreme Unction and Father Corbett gave the absolution. Father Mulvaney died peacefully a half-hour later.

George P. Mulvaney was born in Oconto, Wis., March 10, 1885, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Mulvaney. His father died in 1907. He secured his primary and secondary education in the schools of Oconto and at the age of 17 he entered the novitiate of the Clerics of St. Viator. He was ordained to the priesthood by Rt. Rev. Bishop Fox of Green Bay, Wisconsin in 1909. Throughout the twenty years of his priestly labors he has been stationed at different times in Illinois, Arizona, South Dakota and Texas.

The remains of Father Mulvaney lay in state in St. Edward's Church from the Sunday after his death until the following Tuesday, when Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by Father J. F. Ryan, C. S. V., in the presence of Rt. Rev. Bernard J. Shiel, D. D., Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago. The Rev. William J. Bergin, C. S. V., preached the sermon. The body was removed to Oconto, Wisconsin, where a Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Francis X. Hazen, C. S. V., a friend from boyhood times. The funeral sermon at Oconto was preached by the Very Rev. J. W. R. Maguire, C. S. V., President of St. Viator College. Interment took place in the Oconto Cemetery. The services in Oconto were held in the same church in which Father Mulvaney was baptised, received his first Holy Communion, was confirmed, and was ordained.

Father Mulvaney is survived by his mother, Mrs. Bernard Mulvaney, three brothers and two sisters. His nephew, Bernard G. Mulvaney, is a Viatorian brother. Citizen and man, teacher and priest, Father Mulvaney exemplified the ideal religious. In all the works of his worthy life there was the abounding sanctity of his priestly character and inheritance. His life was an inspiration to all who knew him, and those whom he served were the richer for his service. He leaves, in the Alumni Association of St. Viator College hundreds of sorrowing men who knew him as a friend and counselor.

### Recent Faculty Changes

The Rev. Christopher Marzano, C. S. V., was appointed Vice-President to succeed the Rev. E. V. Cardinal, C. S. V., who is attending Illinois University this year, working for a Ph. D. in history. Father Marzano has been at the college for the last four years. He came here after obtaining a Ph. D. in chemistry at the Catholic University, and has been professor of chemistry here since. His able qualities as an administrator insure Father Maguire a valuable assistant.

The Rev. Thomas J. Lynch is the new Dean, succeeding Father Cardinal in this office. Father Lynch is thoroughly abreast of the times in matters educational, and as Dean should help raise the standards of the college.

The Rev. J. A. Lowney, C. S. V., has been chosen Debate Coach in place of Father Lynch. Father Lowney has always taken interest in forensics at St. Viator College, and is well qualified to lead the college debating teams to championship laurels.

### Five Brothers Make Perpetual Vows

On the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin, five young Viatorian brothers were admitted to perpetual vows in the Community: Brothers Roger Drolet, Paul Hutton, Eugene McCarthy, Raymond Boysen and Joseph Ryan. Three brothers, William Harris, Bernard Mulvaney and John Stafford made vows for three years. Three members of the Community were also promoted to the Majorate, the governing body of the Province: Father Daniel O'Connor, Brother John Koelzer and Brother William Cracknell.

The impressive ceremony followed a Mass in the College Chapel celebrated by the Very Reverend Provincial, Father O'Mahoney. In the reception, Father O'Mahoney also presided, assisted by the Very Rev. J. W. R. Maguire, C. S. V., President of St. Viator College, and the Rev. F. E. Munsch, C. S. V., Director of St. Bernard Scholasticate.

### Retiring Provincial Praised for Able Administration

Father W. J. Surprenant, C. S. V., replaced in the office of Provincial by Father O'Mahoney, has served in this capacity during the past six years. During this period important changes have taken place. The Scholasticate, St. Bernard Hall, was organized on its present basis, and a House of Theological Studies was established at Washington, D. C.; The Noviciate in Chamberlain, S. D., was sold and the erection of the splendid Fournier Institute near Lemont, Ill., to house the Novices and Juvenists of the Province, was well under way when he resigned.

Father Surprenant's resignation, which took effect in June, was induced by the many duties the Provincialship and the Pastorate of Bourbonnais imposed upon him. He will continue to act as Pastor of Maternity Church, Bourbonnais. He leaves the office of Provincial carrying with him the admiration which his splendid services during his administration deserve.

### College Classes Organize for the Coming Year

The first function of the various classes after the arrival of their respective members was the installation of class officers to direct their destinies during the coming school year. The Senior Class, holding their election last spring, honored Paul Mills with the Presidency, Byron Evard as Vice-President, James Brown as Secretary-Treasurer and Daniel Gordon, Delegate to the Advisory Board of the College Club.

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## VIATOR LOSES TO WESLEYAN U.

### Varsity Is Unable to Stop Methodists' Attack.

The St. Viator college football aggregation motored to Bloomington, Saturday, Oct. 5th and accepted a decisive 32 to 6 defeat at the hands of Wesleyan University. It very often happens that the score in a draw foot ball game gives little indication of the real amount of fighting and interesting playing that occurs during the sixty minutes that the two teams face each other.

Such was the case on Saturday at Bloomington. Strange as it may seem, from the overbalanced and disastrous-sounding score, the two elevens fought on even terms almost half the length of the game, before the breaks began to favor the Wesleyan outfit and they so admirably took advantage of them.

St. Viator kicked off to Wesleyan and the Methodists started a march towards the Irish goal that made the backers of the green most uneasy, to say the least. On the Viator 30-yard line Wesleyan was held for downs and the ball went over to the Irish. Furlong got off a pretty punt to take the ball out of the dangerous zone. With both teams fighting for the advantage and each waiting for the break that would throw the tide in their favor, the first quarter ended with the score tied 0 to 0.

The first break came shortly after the second quarter opened, and it did much to crack the fighting morale of the Viator squad. Wesleyan had worked the ball down the field to within striking distance of the goal line only to be repulsed by a hard-fighting, green-jersey-clad line. Twice they held the heavier team for four downs on the 1-yard line—the ball going over to St. Viator in each instance. The second time this happened, Furlong, in attempting to punt from behind his own goal line was hurried into booting the ball straight into the air and it descended into the outstretched arms of a surprised Wesleyan player, just two feet inside the Viator goal. Two more touchdowns were scored before the half ended, the fleetness of Capt. Prosie, Williamson, and Miller accounting for most of the Methodists' yardage.

A rejuvenated Viator eleven took the field after the rest period and began an onslaught that could not be denied. Alternating between off-tackle smashes and short but successful passes, the Green Wave swept across the goal with their first touchdown. A pass Gorman to Gibbons, took the ball across the Wesleyan goal line. Evard's kick for extra point fell short of its mark. The tremendous amount of effort expended in the tiring drive down the field seemed to spell Viator's doom, their strength seemed wasted. The flash was short lived and from then on it was Wesleyan's game. The 4th period was something of a night-mare for the Green, with the game ending—Wesleyan, 32—St. Viator, 6.

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# VIATOR OUTPLAYS NORMAL BUT IS HELD TO SCORELESS TIE IN BATTLE LAST FRIDAY

St. Viator college and Illinois State Normal of Bloomington gave the fans plenty of thrills last Friday night at Bourbonnais when they waded through four quarters in a deluge of rain to a scoreless tie. Despite the handicap of the weather, there was a large crowd present which stuck it out to the finish with that "die for dear old Siwash" spirit.

The Viatorians consistently outplayed their rivals and deserved to win, but fumbles and the breaks of the game spoiled their opportunities whenever they came in the shadows of the goal posts. McAllister's gang chalked up about five first downs to every one made by the invaders. They also excelled in punting, passing, and runs—in fact in every department of the game. Furlong got good distance on most of his kicks, and Gibbons, a speedy end, was down on most of them to nail the receiver in his tracks.

## First Half

Furlong kicked off to start the game to Normal's 40-yd. line. The visitors were held and punted to Evard who was downed on his 25-yd. streak. Furlong caught the visitors napping when he punted on second down and the ball rolled to Normal's 20-yd. line. Normal fumbled and it was Viator's ball on the 30-yd. line. Furlong made it first down after three nice gains by Evard. Evard made another first down and carried the ball to the 5-yd. line where the Viator attack was halted and Normal took the ball on downs. The rest of the first quarter was a punting duel and Clothier made a first down as the period ended.

Clothier opened the second quarter by fiddling through for a first down a few yards from the goal. Then Viator's chances to score were submerged when they were handed two 15-yd. penalties and Todd lost ten when he slipped in a mud puddle after attempting to grab a poor pass from center, putting the ball in the 50-yd. line. Furlong then punted to Normal's 20-yd. line. Another exchange of punts and then Furlong hit the line for eleven yards and a first down. Furlong plunged for five more and Evard added seven for first down. Viator was penalized five and then Normal intercepted a pass on their 40-yd. line. Normal made its initial first down when Mooney scooted end for 12 yards, but was later held and punted to Evard on his 15-yd. line. A long pass, Evard to Furlong, was good for 15 yards. Normal was penalized five and

then Evard ran end for 15 more, taking the ball to midfield. A pass, Todd to Evard, was grounded but allowed by the officials because of interference. Another pass, Todd to Furlong brought the ball to Normal's 15-yd. line but Viator's march was halted as the whistle for the half blew with the score still 0 to 0.

## Second Half

The rain started in earnest when the second half opened but the fans stuck it out. Furlong again kicked off and Mooney made a nice return to his 40-yd. line. Normal completed a 15-yd. pass and then Viator took the ball on downs. Evard gained nine and Clothier made it first down. Viator fumbled on Normal's 45-yd. marker. The visitors were penalized five and finally punted to Evard on the latter's 45-yd. line. Furlong plunged for eight and Clothier made first down. Evard made eight and Furlong made first down. Furlong carried the ball to Normal's 20-yd. line and then Viator was again penalized fifteen. A pass was incomplete and Todd punted out of bounds on Normal's 10-yd. line. The kick was returned and Clothier made a first down as the third quarter ended.

Normal took the ball on downs to start the final period and then Mooney ran for 30 yards. The visitors were penalized five and punted to Viator's 30-yd. line. Two Viator fumbles lost 15 yards and a bad punt gave the visitors the ball on Viator's 15-yd. line. The play was recalled and Normal penalized five for off-side. Normal was then penalized 15 for stalling. Another exchange of kicks brought the ball to Normal's 15-yd. line. A flock of passes were tried by both teams, but none were completed because of the slipperiness of the oval. Viator blocked a punt on Normal's 15-yd. line as the game ended.

# VIATOR DROPS FIRST TO CARBONDALE

Irish Weaken in Fourth Quarter and Allow Teachers to Score

St. Viator opened its football season Friday night, Sept. 27 with Southern Illinois Normal University of Carbondale. The result was far from favorable for St. Viator; the final score was 6—0 in favor of the visitors. The game was an epoch-making event in the history of the Little Nineteen Conference since it marked the first encounter of two Little Nineteen schools under the huge reflectors.

The Carbondale team has a slight advantage in weight, but the aggressiveness of the Irish outfit kept the game evenly balanced for over three quarters of the sixty minute stretch. In fact, the balance seemed to weigh in favor of the St. Viator team until the latter part of the fourth quarter when the teachers, with a sudden spurt, neared the Viator goal line. Then a fifteen yard pass, G. Morton to Capt. Newton, scored the deciding six points. Co-Capt. Lutz failed to add the extra point with an attempted drop kick.

The Southerners were kept in the hole throughout most of the first half by the very excellent punting of Furlong and Todd. Evard's fine exhibition of returning punts helped much to keep his team in the running. Throughout the game the rough edges which usually characterize an early season contest cropped up at every stage. The brightly lighted field seemed to emphasize each small error on the part of both teams.

Capt. Newton won the toss and chose to defend the north goal. Viator kicked off to McArth and the ball was downed on the Carbondale forty yard line. Hudgens fumbled but recovered and then G. Martin hit center for five yards. G. Martin then kicked to Viator's thirty-five yard line and Evard returned ten yards. The Irish failed to gain and Evard kicked to the Teachers' fifteen yard line. G. Martin kicked on the first down and the Irish promptly returned the kick—the ball rolling to the two yard line.

The break which Carbondale took advantage of and which won the game came late in the fourth quarter. Evard attempted a punt from his own twenty-five yard line just after Lutz had gotten away a sixty yard boot. Hughes broke through and partially blocked the effort. The ball bounded away to one side and Bradham grabbed the leather and set sail for the goal line. He was forced out on the twelve yard line. Carbondale essayed one play and fumbled and Viator recovered. Evard's kick was hurried and short.

Carbondale completed a pass for a first down. They then rammed the ends and the line to the fifteen yard mark. From there G. Martin tossed a pass to Capt. Newton for a touchdown.

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# CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

## COLLEGE CLUB OF ST. VIATOR COLLEGE.

(The custom has arisen of printing every year in the first issue of The Viatorian a copy of the Constitution of the College Club of St. Viator College. The copy follows, together with its amendments. It is suggested that each student preserve a copy for reference.)

We, the Students of St. Viator College do hereby form an association, to be known as the College Club, for the purpose of fostering student activities, of improving the intellectual, moral, and social life of the student body, of securing a reasonable measure of student government, of rendering organized assistance to the Faculty in the advancement and development of our Alma Mater, do hereby ordain and adopt the following Constitution and By-laws:

### ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the College Club.

Section 2. The membership of the College Club shall consist of all students regularly matriculated at St. Viator College. Special students taking at least twelve hours a week in regular college courses are also eligible for membership.

### ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The officers of the College Club shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Members of the Advisory Board, and two delegates to the College Council.

Section 2. All officers shall hold office only for the term of the current scholastic year for which they shall have been elected.

Section 3. All officers with the exception of the members of the advisory board shall be elected as follows: At the first regular meeting of the College Club in the month of May nominations shall be made from the floor in regular form for all the offices for the next scholastic year. Each nomination must receive a second. The Secretary shall keep a record of all names receiving a nomination and a second for each office. When nominations have been received for all the offices the meeting shall adjourn for a period of not less than three days and not more than six days, shall then reconvene and proceed by secret ballot to the election of officers from those whose names have previously been placed in nomination. Three tellers shall be appointed by the President to count the votes. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes for each office shall be declared elected to that office.

Section 4. No student shall be eligible for office who has not fulfilled the scholastic requirements of his year in College. Special students are not eligible to hold office.

### ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The duties of the President shall be to call regular and special meetings of the College Club, to preside at such meetings, to initiate and foster student activities, to represent the College Club on all public occasions, and generally to fulfill the functions of the presiding officer of similar organizations.

Section 2. The duties of the Vice-President shall be to act in the place of the President when the latter is absent or for any reason unable to perform his functions.

Section 3. The duties of the Secretary shall be to keep the minutes of the meetings, to prepare and maintain an accurate list of all the members of the College Club, to call the role when the viva voce vote is required, to answer all written communications after consultation with the President, and to read all communications received to the first regular meeting of the College Club, and generally to perform the duties of a secretary of a deliberative assembly.

Section 4. The duties of the Treasurer shall be to collect and keep all dues and other monies, to render an accurate account of them to each regular meeting of the College Club, to pay all properly incurred debts upon order of the President and Secretary.

Section 5. The Offices of Secretary and Treasurer may be held by the same member, if the College Club shall so determine by a majority vote of all the members present at the nominating meeting.

### ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The Members of the Advisory Board shall be the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer of the College Club, and one member elected from each of the Freshmen, Sophomore, Junior and Senior classes. Each class shall meet separately to elect its representatives on the Advisory Board, and shall do so in accordance with its own Constitution and By-Laws, provided that no one ineligible under this constitution shall be elected by any of the classes as members of the Advisory Board.

Section 2. The duties of the Advisory Board shall be to consider and report to the College Club all matters within the purpose of the College Club, and generally to fulfill the functions of an executive committee. The Advisory Board shall be the final interpreters of the Constitution and By-Laws in the event of disputes.

### ARTICLE V

Section 1. The Delegates to the College Council shall be the President ex-officio and one member elected in accordance with the provisions of Article II, Section 3, of this Constitution.

Section 2. Two alternates, one an alternate to the President, and an alternate to the regular delegate, shall also be elected in accordance with the provisions of Article II, Section 3, of this constitution, who shall act only in the event that the regular delegates are prevented from performing their duties.

Section 3. The duties of the Delegates to the College Council shall be to attend all meetings of the College Council called to consider matters directly affecting the welfare of the student body, with the exception of the determination of scholastic standards and requirements. They shall vote as members of the College Council on proposed changes in the rules of discipline, on the punishment of students brought before the Council for serious offenses, and shall generally represent the student body before the supreme governing authority of St. Viator College.

### ARTICLE VI

Section 1. The amount of the annual dues shall be determined each year by a majority vote of the membership of the College Club at a regular meeting.

Section 2. No member shall have the right to vote on any question brought before the College Club, who has not paid his dues, to date.

### ARTICLE VII

Section 1. The regular meetings of the College Club shall take place twice a month during the scholastic year on days to be determined each year by majority vote of the meeting at which the permanent officers shall be elected.

Section 2. Special meetings of the College Club may be called at any time by the President. He shall always call a special meeting when requested by another officer, by a member of the Advisory Board, by any other two members of the College Club, or by a member of the Faculty.

### ARTICLE VIII

Section 1. A quorum for the purpose of any meeting shall consist of at least one third of the total membership of the College Club.

### ARTICLE IX

Section 1. A member of the Faculty shall be invited by the Advisory Board to act each year as Faculty Adviser to the College Club.

### ARTICLE X

Section 1. This Constitution may be amended as follows: The proposed amendment shall be read before a regular meeting of the College Club, and shall then be referred to the Members of the Advisory Board, who shall, after serious deliberation, vote to accept or reject it. If the vote of the Advisory Board is favorable to the proposed amendment, it shall be submitted to the Faculty Adviser for his approval, and if this is secured, the amendment shall be reported back favorably to the College Club. A vote shall then be taken, and if the amendment secures a majority of the votes of all the members of the College Club, it shall be considered adopted, and of the same force as the other provisions of this Constitution.

### AMENDMENT I

(to Article III, Section 1)

"The duties of the President shall be to call regular and special meetings of the College Club, to preside at such meetings, to initiate and foster student activities, to represent the College Club on all public occasions, and generally to fulfill the functions of the presiding officer of similar organizations. Upon the first meeting of his Advisory Board he shall appoint, with the approval of the Advisory Board, chairmen to supervise the work of the Social Service and Insurance Committees."

### AMENDMENT II

(to Article IV, Section 1.)

"The members of the Advisory Board shall be the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer of the College Club, and one member elected from each of the Freshmen, Sophomore, Junior and Senior Classes, and their presidents ex-officio. Each class shall meet separately to elect its own representatives on the Advisory Board and shall do so in accordance with its own Constitution and By-Laws, provided that no one ineligible under this constitution shall be elected by any of the classes as members of the Advisory Board."

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
