

College Lays Plans For Sixty-Ninth Graduation

Edward Buttgen, Class President, To Deliver The Valedictory

The Class of 1937 will be graduated on June 6 with ceremonies which have become traditional for Viator Commencements. Graduates will bid farewell to their Alma Mater before hundreds of alumni and friends returned to the campus to witness the College's most pretentious academic ceremony.

Dr. Jerome Kerwin, Dean of the School of Social Studies at the University of Chicago, will be the principal commencement day speaker and will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. His Excellency, Bernard J. Sheil, senior auxiliary Bishop of Chicago, has been invited to preside at the exercises.

Speakers Named

Three orations are annually included in the graduation program. Edward Buttgen, class president, has been named by the faculty Committee on Graduation to deliver the class Valedictory. Bachelor orations have been assigned to Brother Francis E. Williams, C. S. V., and Samuel Hamilton. Liberty and modern democracy will be the central theme for this year's speeches.

Graduation exercises, scheduled for three o'clock, will be preceded by the annual Class Banquet in the Commons. Farewell toasts will be offered by Marshall Lamore, Brother Elder Senesac, William J. Schumacher, Henry Wulfe, Kenneth Wiser and Miss Claire Legris. Frank Straub, president-elect of next year's senior class, will be invested with cap and gown by Edward Buttgen, president of the graduates. Mr. Straub will deliver a Farewell address to the seniors.

The Rev. J. W. R. Maguire, C. S. V., is in charge of the commencement day speeches and program.

V., president of the College, parents of prospective students may also join the club.

Officers Selected

At the crowded inaugural meeting officers were elected for the coming year. Mrs. Frank Knippen of Chicago, mother of Frank Knippen, '39, was named president; Mrs. William Cahill of Chicago, mother of William Cahill, '39, vice-president; and Mrs. Theresa Boyle of Joliet, mother of John Boyle, '39, secretary-treasurer. Present plans of the new organization call for the appointment of regional vice-presidents by the club's officers.

The Very Rev. Dr. E. V. Cardinal, C. S. V., president of the College, accepted the post of faculty moderator of the Parent's Club.

John Foxen to Head Holy Name Society

Members of the Holy Name Society went to the polls last Thursday to elect John Foxen, '38, of West Chicago, president of the organization by an overwhelming majority. The new chief, who has served as head of the St. John Berchman Society this year, succeeds Richard Powers, '39.

Three candidates were in the race for each of the offices. The new executives take over a well-organized society. The retiring officers have this year made the Holy Name Society one of the outstanding campus organizations. Under the leadership of Richard Powers, the society has become an active force in Viator life.

Few Vote

The quiteness of the election was in marked contrast with the heat of previous campaign's and contested voting. The fact that less than one-third of the eligible voters went to the polls has been attributed by commentators to the lack of any pressing campus issue.

Sanhuber succeeds George Rogers, who lead the College Club during the past year. Frank Straub, popular vice-president of last year, refused to run for any College Club office this year. Gene Larkin, current secretary of the organization, ran for the presidency this year but failed to show the political strength of past years.

Bro. Alfred Herbert Debaters' New Chief

Election of the officers of the Bergin Debating Society at the annual forensic banquet May 11, gave Brother Alfred Hebert, '38, the presidency and Brother Donald Foley, '40, the secretaryship. The new officers succeed President Patrick Toomey, C. S. V., '37; Secretary Eugene Larkin, '38, and Manager Edward Buttgen, '37.

The work of the Bergin Debating Society was carried on this year by 18 members. Only Bro. Toomey and Mr. Buttgen will be lost to next year's squad by graduation.

Guest speakers had nothing but praise for the Bergin debaters and praised the scholastic and extra-curricular achievements of the squad. Short talks were given by the four conference men.

Father Maguire in concluding his speech of the evening paid Eddie Buttgen the highest compliment ever paid by a debate coach to a St. Viator debater. He said that "Mr. Buttgen is one of the best debaters that has ever represented the College. He takes his place along with the greatest—"Toby" Shea, "Tim" Rowan, Gill Middleton, etc."

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Martyred

Word was recently received here by the college authorities of the martyrdom of a Viatorian confrere, Brother Leoncio Gorostiza, C. S. V.

Brother Gorostiza, according to reports forwarded to the college administration, was killed by the Reds at Bilbao, Spain on April 20 of this year. He was but twenty-three years of age and had been a member of the Viatorian Community in Spain for the past seven years.

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Sterilization Scored By Fr. John Maguire

Rev. J. W. R. Maguire, C. S. V., head of the Sociology Department, addressed the Holy Name Society on Thursday, May 13, on the subject of "Sterilization."

Father Maguire defined sterilization as "a process making the bearing of children either temporarily or permanently impossible" and he pointed out that pro-sterilization laws have been passed in many states at one time or another. The lecturer explained that these laws were passed to prevent the propagation of the insane and physically defective.

The speaker pointed out that the Catholic Church is opposed to the practice of sterilization. Father Maguire cited the encyclicals of Pope Pius XI to substantiate his contention. He further stated that the State is justified in legislating and enforcing sterilization only when "the burden of supporting defectives and insane persons becomes too great and public welfare is endangered".

Dick Weicker got the "Cardinals" off on the victory march by topping Johnnie Foxen, 2 1-2 to 1 1-2, while Jack Secord eliminated Regan, the Irish number three man, 2 to 1. Led by the unbeatable Don Betourne, who snared five first places and tied for another, the Upperclassmen for the second time in two years, managed to come from behind to win "The Little Brown Jug," the emblem of class supremacy here at St. Viator College. Final tabulations of the day's scoring gave the Upperclassmen 115 points to 88 for the Freshman Gladiators, who at one time led their "superiors" by 30 points.

Competition in all events was keen and true to the predictions of the athletic department, records set last year tumbled before the onslaughts of the determined Upperclassmen and Freshmen. In all 8 new track and field records for the Parent's Day games were set, while four of the old swimming records went by the boards.

Tortorello Frosh Champ

Don Betourne, defending physical education champion, easily retained his title by garnering 27 out of a possible 30 points. Tortorello, freshman star of the day, had the second highest individual total. His 15 points gave him the title of Freshman Physical Education Champion. Jake Bower, physical education champion of the freshmen last year, was second high scorer for the Upperclassmen while Eddie O'Connor, star distance man of the Frosh squad, earned second scoring honors of his team with 10 points.
