WATSON ELECTED TO PRESIDENCY OF COLLEGE CLUB

**Brown Elected Vice-President;
Long and Clothier,
Officers**

Mr. Jarlath (Jay) Watson, of Odell, Illinois, was elected President of the College Club by a very decided majority on Thursday, May 17. In choosing Mr. Watson to act as their chief executive for the year 1928-1929, the members of the Club picked a man who is not only quite capable of handling the difficult task but is also sure to lead the Club through a most successful year. Mr. Watson has been one of the most active members of the College Club during the past two years and this fact alone offers assurance that he will run the Club in a 'ne plus ultra' fashion. During the past two years, he has served as member of the Advisory Board, and during the past year has acted as chairman of the Social Committee. The fine work that he has done in the latter capacity has won the admiration of the student body. During the past year, he likewise acted as vice-president of the Sophomore class and will hold a similar chair in the Bergin Debating Society next year. The student body can certainly feel that their choice has been exceptionally good.

James Brown experienced difficulty in winning the office of Vice-President over Eddie Campbell and Byron Evard. The fact, however, that he defeated these two popular men would indicate that he is entirely fit to serve in such an office. Jim is one of the most willing men on the campus and no doubt will prove a big aid to President Watson. It was to the joy of many that Steve Long won the position of Secretary. Steve is steady and reliable and will find no difficulty in fulfilling the duties that the office of Secretary demand of him. The popular choice for Treasurer was Kenneth Clothier. The decisive manner in which Ken won over such able financiers as Meis and Tucker shows that the Club was not hesitant in placing its pecuniary fund in his hands. Perhaps Ken's popularity will enable him to bolster up a rather bedraggled bank book. Mr. Allen James Nolan, retiring president of the Club, was almost unanimously chosen as Delegate-at-large to the College Council. Though the office itself is not functional, in as much as it was dissolved by College authorities two years back, it was placed on the list to give evidence of the students' wish to regain the privilege that was once accorded them.

Installation ceremonies were held on Wednesday, May 23. President Nolan delivered the main departure speech and concluded with the wish that his successor, Mr. Watson, would enjoy a highly successful year and that he would receive the hearty cooperation of every member. The other retiring officers, likewise, commended the Club on their wise selection of new officers and added the hope that the Club would continue to make the progress that it has done in the past. Nominations for the various offices were in order at the meeting of May 14. Not less than nine nominees declined the nomination to the office of presidency but, fortunately, two of the best choices re-

mained, Mr. Watson and Mr. Laenhardt. Mr. Leo Fitzgerald, President of the Senior Class, had the honor of nominating the winning candidate. ST. VIATOR NO. 2 Mr. Brown, Vice President-elect, was nominated by his classmate Mr. Evard. Mr. Laenhardt, candidate for presidency gave Mr. Long a good send-off in his nomination speech while Mr. Hickey won approval in his nomination of Mr. Clothier. The elections were marked by some very vigorous campaigning which did not cease until the polls were declared closed. Mr. Ernest Walsko, retiring chairman of the Membership Committee, maintained splendid order at the polls and together with his able-bodied assistant, Johnny Herbert, deserves great credit from all. The Viatorian extends its congratulations to the new officers and expresses the hope that they will surpass the great work performed by the retiring officers. As the voice of the student body, the Viatorian, likewise, wishes to express its thanks to the retiring officers for the work they have accomplished during their regime together with the hope that they will prove as successful in their future undertakings as they have as officers of the College Club.

Automobile Escort to Accompany Bishop's Party from Chicago

With the rapid approach of June 5th comes the satisfaction of knowing that all preparations for the day have been completed, and that, if good management and well laid plans count for anything, the day will go down in Viator history as the greatest ever witnessed on our Campus. The Committee on Arrangements working from the Alumni and Extension office in Chicago and assisted by Father Maguire and Mr. Edward Gallahue at the College have arranged an extensive and imposing program which is briefly summarized below.

Early Monday afternoon, June 4th, an escort of automobiles will accompany the Bishop and his party from 79th St., and Wetsern Avenue, Chicago, to the College. Another party from the College will journey to Momence and join the procession at that point. The augmented party will then proceed to Kankakee where Bishop Sheil will be greeted officially by the Mayor, Honorable Louis L. Beckman. Immediately upon arrival at the College, dinner will be served to the party.

Pontifical Solemn High Mass will be celebrated in the College Chapel of the Sacred Heart by Bishop Sheil on Tuesday, June 5th, at 10:30 A. M. The Bishop will be assisted by Very Rev. Monsignor James J. Horsburgh, Deacon; Rev. Louis M. O'Connor, Subdeacon; Rev. William Keefe, Master of Ceremonies. Deacons of Honor will be Rev. John J. Flanagan and Rev. Gerald V. Bergin. Rev. James Fitzgerald and Rev. Frank Cleary will act as acolytes.

The banquet in honor of Bishop Sheil on the occasion of Commencement will be at 12:30 P. M., in the College refectory. Rev. Patrick C. Conway will be toastmaster, introducing the following speakers: The Very Rev. M. J. Marsile, c. s. v., Very Rev. J. V. Rheams, c. s. v., the Reverend Fathers C. P. Conway, Louis M. O'Connor, John J. Flanagan, J. V. LaMarre, and Messrs. Warren J. McClelland, Lowell A. Lawson, John R. O'Connor, and the Rt. Rev. B. J. Sheil. Entertainment of various natures will be provided in the afternoon. The evening will be fully occupied with the College Graduation Exercises.

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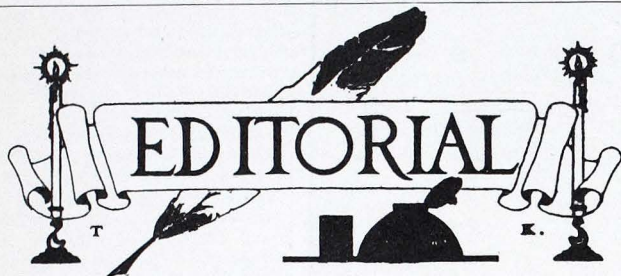

Anderhub Wins Academy Tennis Championship

McGoorty managed to defeat Hesse but only after one of the hardest fought battles of the tournament. The game in which Gallagher defeated Rice was marked by the singular fact that the second set went to 12-10 before the latter won out. In the other first round matches, Comina outclassed Graham, Anderhub conquered little Joe Degnan, McKeown won from Gendron Legris, and Rodriguez gained the decision over Jack Casey.

In the second round, Cody went into the finals of the upper bracket by beating Doyle, 7-5 and 6-0, and Gallagher won the right to oppose him by downing Comina. Rodriguez entered the finals of the lower bracket by disposing of Harry McKeown in two tough sets, 7-5 and 7-5. Anderhub was the only other player to reach the third round. He had to whip Bob McGoorty to do so, but Andy set about his work from the opening serve, and soon piled up an insurmountable lead. In the first half of the eight three errors enabled the Jacksonvillites to knot the count, but not for long, for in the home half Campbell drove a long triple to right center. With "Soup" waiting to be scored Laenhardt drove the first ball pitched to left for a single and the ball game. Delaney retired the opposition in order in the ninth and Viator had avenged the early season trimming handed them by Illinois.

The whole club played good ball behind the steady pitching of Delaney who allowed only one hit, that accounting for the first run of the game. Viator gathered six hits off the efforts of Newkirk and displayed a well balanced defense except in the eighth.

In spite of this handicap the boys threw quite a scare into the Notre Dame camp. In the first inning, after Evard was retired, Todd hit to center for a single. Tom Ferris followed to the plate, and blasted one of Walsh's fast ones to the extremes of the park, and made the circuit for a homer. With this pretentious start the Viator boys retired to the field and Notre Dame started to swing the war clubs. Schrall of N. D. hit an easy bouncer to Laenhardt at third who promptly turned it into a hit by permitting it to roll between his legs. The next man up bunted and beat the throw to first. Harrington, pitching for Viator, walked the next man, Colerick, and then fanned Lordi. Neimeie's hit to Evard who made a wild throw permitting one tally. Ferris recovered the heave, but held the ball while Colerick pedaled home for the second Notre Dame score. A long fly to center drove in the third counter, and the Green trailed 3 to 2.

In the fourth Canto, Notre Dame scored two more tallies on two hits and a free ticket to first making the count 5 to 2. In the seventh, two errors by Sullivan of N. D. and hits by Harrington and Evard knotted the score at five all. In the home half of the eighth, Sullivan walked and the troublesome Colerick socked a triple to the fence in left center. He scored when Walsko dropped Harrington's throw on Lordi's bunt. Viator went into the ninth trailing by two tallies. Delaney died on a liner to right, and Harrington was safe on Neimeie's error and scored when Evard pumped a line double to left field. On Todd's tap to Walsh, Evard was killed on the line, and Todd advanced to escond. Ferris then hit a long fly to right field, retiring the side.

The tightness of the game, as indicated by the score, made the contest thrilling to say the least. Harrington pitched a good game for Viator, holding the N. D. Irish to five hits. Streaks of wildness together with errors by his team-mates lost the game. The Viator Club climbed on Walsh's delivery for nine assorted wallops, ranging from Ferris' homer to sundry singels.
