COLLEGE PRESIDENT TO WELCOME STUDENTS

Laymen's Retreat Popular; Attendance Increasing

Rev. William J. Bergin Preaches Most Successful Retreat In History Of Movement

The third annual Laymen's Retreat began on Friday evening, September 10, and ended with a banquet at noon on the following Sunday. Much of the credit for the success of the retreat is due to the efforts of the Rev. William J. Bergin, C. S. V., the retreat master, who preached with his usual eloquence and fervor, and instilled into the hearts of the retreatants a greater love of God and a higher sense of duty. He began by establishing the existence of God, and then pointed out that the other profound truths of Catholicism follow with devastating logic to those who are able to think clearly and consistently. Much fine comment was heard on his sermons, especially those on the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, and on Prayer, many of the retreatants saying that they were the best sermons they ever heard on those subjects.

President Speaks
The Banquet Sunday noon which closed the retreat was featured by the orations of the Very Rev. Dr. E. V. Cardinal, C. S. V., president of the College, and Probate Judge George Rooney of Chicago. Among the other speakers were the Rev. William E. Cracknell, C. S. V., registrar of the College; the Rev. Paul Hutton, C. S. V., Dean of Men; Joseph McGovern, president of the Viator club in Chicago; Jack Hickey, Dr. Fahlstrom, and Dr. Karney.

Movement Popular
The Laymen's Retreat movement is becoming more popular every year. At the first retreat held two years ago, the sponsors thought they were doomed to dismal failure, because only seventeen men made

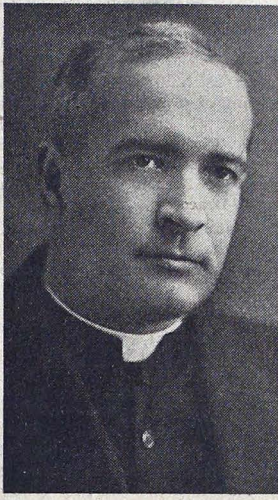

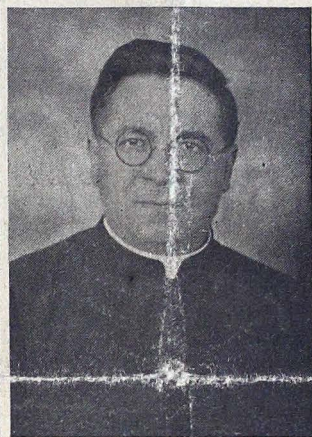

Rev. P. Farley In Visit Here

The Very Rev. Paul Farley, C. S. V., recently elected Superior General of the Clerics of St. Viator, is now engaged in his canonical tour of the Viatorian Houses in the United States Province. Father Farley arrived in Chicago on August 21, after having visited the Canadian Province of Viatorian Fathers. The College will be his headquarters while he is in America, and before returning to Brussels, he will familiarize himself with the conditions of the various houses of the order, and become acquainted with all of the Clerics.

Mr. Dorian Wilkinson of Michigan State College has been appointed head basketball coach by the College Council, according to an announcement made recently by the Very Rev. Dr. E. V. Cardinal, C. S. V., president of the College. Mr. Wilkinson was graduated in '37 with an A. B. degree, majoring in Mathematics and Physical Education. Along with his coaching duties, Mr. Wilkinson will also take over the post of Professor of Mathematics.

Years of Experience
Mr. Wilkinson began playing basketball in his freshman year in high school and has been playing the game ever since, so he is thoroughly acquainted with all the intricacies of the game. In his first year at Michigan State he played regular center on the freshman team, and also played quite a bit of baseball and track. In his sophomore, junior and senior years he held down the position of regular center on the varsity squad, and was responsible to a great extent, for the fine showing made by the Michigan State basketball team last year.

Regulars Returning
Coach Wilkinson will lose three of the outstanding stars of last year in Captain George Rogers, Tommy Gibbons, and Don Betourne. However, with the return of such great lettermen as "Bones" Straub, "Red" McElligot, "Streaky Bob" Lenehan, "Bud" Monahan, "Danny" Blazeovich, "Babe" Claves, "Red" Hart, "Cheese" Walsh, and John Burke, the new coach should have plenty of experienced material to work with.

Coach Wilkinson has announced that he would probably use the Van-Alstine type of play, a system which features screen plays with a fast breaking offense.

Viator All-Stars Return To Assist Coach Lou Zarza With Football Team

In Lou Zarza and his two able assistants, Joe Saia and Tommy Gibbons, St. Viator College boasts the only all-star roaching staff in the country. Lou Zarza won All-American honors as a member of the '36 all-star aggregation, while Saia and Gibbons received the greatest honors football can bestow upon her knights of the gridiron this year, when they also basked in the blazing glory of All-American fame. They were chosen, along with the other outstanding football stars in the country, to play on the team which whipped the Green Bay Packers, champions of the National Professional Football League, in one of the most thrilling battles ever staged on the gridiron. Joe Saia received

all-star honors when he polled a total of 433,855 votes, while Tommy Gibbons received a total of 441,647 votes. Both boys were also chosen on numerous all-conference teams, and Gibbons was named captain on the team picked by the Republican-News International News Service.

Joe is working hard, trying to develop a guard who will be able to stop the hard driving backs of the opposition with the skill and finesse that Joe had when he used to stop them. Tommy Gibbons is looking for a couple of good half-backs who will be able to carry the ball with a little of the speed and drive that Tommy had when he was out there fighting for dear old Alma Mater.

Brother Ginsburg Ordained to Holy Priesthood By Bishop J. Griffin

Brother Norbert Ginsburg, C. S. V., was ordained to the Holy Priesthood on Sunday, September 12, by the Most Rev. James Griffin, Bishop of the diocese of Springfield. Father Ginsburg celebrated his first Solemn High Mass on Sunday, September 19, at All Saints Parish in Chicago.

Father Ginsburg, whose mother was Polish and his father Jewish, was born in Chicago on June 12, 1912. He received his early training in All Saints Grammar School, and from there entered Quigley Preparatory Seminary. He was graduated with high honors in '30, after completing five years of hard work there. He then entered St. Mary of the Lake Seminary in Mundelein, Ill., but he was forced to quit after three years because of ill-health.

Enters Novitiate

After spending a summer convalescing, he was in comparatively good health, so he entered the Viatorian Novitiate in August, 1934, where he was received into the Order by the Very Rev. J. P. O'Mahoney, C. S. V., Provincial of the Clerics of St. Viator. After spending a year at the Novitiate, he went to the Catholic University of America to further his studies in theology. He completed his studies there last year when he was graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Sacred Theology.

On September 4, 1937, he pronounced his perpetual vows in the College Chapel. They were received by the Very Rev. Paul Farley, Superior General of the order. He was

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SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

For over seventy years St. Viator College has taught the Eternal Truths of Catholicism to thousands of her students, Catholic as well as non-Catholic. She stands out like a gleaming star in the firmament of an educational system which has been blackened by the doctrines of men like Stalin, Lenin, and a host of the other false gods of the Pantheon. She has grounded her students in the truths of the temporal as well as the eternal order, and consequently she is able to send forth from her portals sterling, Christian, God-fearing men, who are useful and upright citizens.

The great Archbishop McNicholas has recently said that the greatest perils to our modern youth are the schools, the colleges, and the universities "in which every subject is studied except God, and all that God implies." The schools whose predominate characteristics are the "chaos, disorder, wildness, and confusion of modern thought", as the president of one of our great institutions of learning has so aptly put it. And it is in institutions such as this that the great majority of American young men are educated. Contrast St. Viator College with this type of university. It is a college which fearlessly teaches the philosophy based on the wisdom of the ages; a philosophy which has ordered and unified the thought of the Greek World, the Middle Ages, and all the great intellectuals of modern times.

How can the youth of today become the responsible men and women of tomorrow if they are educated in schools in which religion and morality are excluded, and they grow into maturity as religious illiterates? They are as effectively deprived of the right to know God as if they had been born in the God-less Union of Soviet Russia, only our methods are more hypocritical and insidious.

Therefore, let us be grateful that we have the opportunity of being strengthened in a Catholic college so that we can preserve our Christian Heritage when we go out into a world filled with the darkness of irreligion and immorality, where murders, divorces, robberies, and oppressions of the poor are commonplace news, and a thousand and one intrinsically repugnant movements are covered with the mantles of free love and modernism. Here, at a school which teaches truths built on eternal adamant, we receive the necessary graces to go out into a world of iniquity and remain unscathed.

Since our parents are making such great sacrifices to send us to a Catholic school, let us spend our time as profitably as possible. And let us also take time out from the cares and troubles of life, and be grateful from the depths of our hearts for the privilege of obtaining a Catholic education. And let us also bear in mind that we are responsible to Almighty God for every second of the time we spend here.

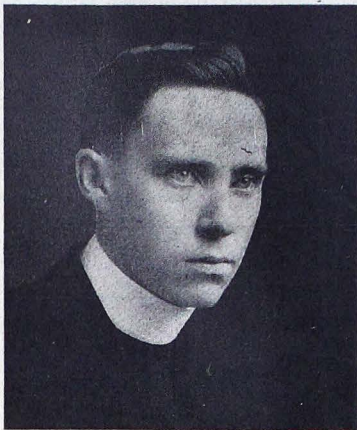
The Rev. J. E. Williams, moderator of the International Relations club, was working for his Doctorate at the Catholic University.
