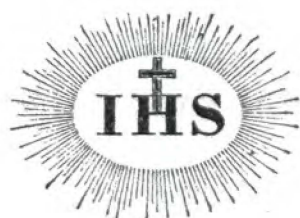

PROSPECTUS.

St. Viateur's College situated at Bourbonnais Grove, Kankakee County, Illinois, is distant about fifty miles from Chicago, and two-and-a-half miles from Kankakee city. Just on the verge of an extensive grove of forest trees and hard by the banks of the Kankakee, the site is singularly beautiful and healthy. Whilst near enough to enjoy all the advantages of a city when needed, yet the college, by its position, is far enough removed from worldly distractions and moral dangers.

This Institution, founded in 1865, was raised to the rank, and invested with the power and privileges of a University by an act of the State Legislature, in February, 1874.

It is under the direction of the Priests of the Congregation of St. Viateur, with whom is associated an efficient corps of other ecclesiastical professors. The Professors and Tutors reside in the Institution and devote themselves entirely to the duties of their profession. They form but one family with the students, and exercise a mild and paternal, yet, firm and constant supervision, friendly in the highest degree to discipline, decorum and good morals.

The system of education embraces: the Classical and Commercial Courses, the Sciences, also Philosophy and Theology. No student is allowed to graduate or take his degrees without having first gone through his prescribed course and only after giving decided evidence of his fitness both at private and public examinations. Those who graduate as Bachelors of Arts may, on proper application made to the President and Faculty, receive the degree of Master of Arts, provided they shall have devoted at least two years to literary pursuits.

The study of letters is helped and encouraged by an excellent Circulating Library. (We take this occasion to thank friends for contributions already received and solicit further patronage for our library.)

The College grounds are large and well shaded, having ball alleys, and abundant room for all games and athletic exercises.

The buildings can accommodate two hundred students. The halls and rooms are spacious, airy and comfortable. The diet of the students is always wholesome and abundant. In sickness they are nursed and watched over with parental solicitude; and all the care that parents can desire is given to the wardrobe, dormitories and all those departments on which health, comfort and economy depend.

There are two sessions, one beginning on the first Tuesday of September, the other on the first of February. At the close of each session all the classes are examined. On both occasions, bulletins are sent to parents or guardians informing them of the standing, progress, application, health, etc., of their children or wards. At the close of the academic year, candidates for degrees are publicly examined. At the Commencement, degrees are conferred and premiums distributed.

Students may enter at any time, and will be charged from date of entrance; it is much to their advantage, however, to enter at the opening of the September session. Should a student leave the College before the close of a session, no deduction will be made except in case of protracted sickness or dismissal. A student who has been at any other institution must produce a satisfactory recommendation from the Superior thereof. The classes a student is to attend will be determined by an examination. He may afterwards be promoted for merit.

While the government of the College is mild and parental, the laws of good order, propriety and morality are strictly enforced. The moral influence of instruction, persuasion and encouragement is primarily and mainly relied on, and seldom found ineffectual.

SOME GENERAL RULES.

1. Every Catholic student is instructed in the doctrine, and bound to the practice of his religion.
2. The religion of non-Catholic students will not be interfered with; for the sake of uniformity however, all must conform to the general exercises of the College.
3. Students must obey every summons of the bell promptly and in silence.
4. The use or introduction of intoxicating liquors, the use of tobacco, card-playing, and every species of gambling, are forbidden.

5 Every two weeks a medal, to be worn as a badge of honor during the next term of competition, is awarded to that member of each class who has specially distinguished himself for conduct and progress during the two previous weeks; to serve this and other ends, a careful report of each student is given to the President and is publicly read every second week.

6. No one may leave the College grounds without permission from proper authority.

7. Parents and friends of the students may visit the College on reception days only—*i. e.*, on Thursdays and Sundays.

8. Permission to go home will be given to students only in case of the serious illness of some member of their family; exceptions may be made in behalf of the minors.

9. The penalty of expulsion is incurred by wanton and repeated violations of established rules, by irreligious language or writings, the introduction of infidel or immoral books, or other grave offences against morality or discipline.

10. For those wishing to join the military company it will be necessary to procure upon their arriving at the College a military suit. We earnestly engage students to join this society as its drills and exercises greatly tend to develop and strengthen the physique and also improves the general carriage of the members.

11. There is no Easter vacation. Visits home at this time, and indeed at all times during the scholastic year, are absolutely discountenanced.

12. Students not returning at the appointed time after the Christmas holidays forfeit their rights to medals.

The Superiors of the institution will very justly discountenance all such visits, no matter under what plea made, and will be loath to see the necessity of premitting what can seldom occur without useless expense, loss of time and prejudice to discipline.

The college will furnish nothing to students, unless a sufficient sum be placed in the hands of the Treasurer.

Payment must be made half yearly in advance; if not, the student will be liable to be sent home.

COURSE OF STUDIES.

PREPARATORY COURSE.

This course, which requires more or less time, according to the age and disposition of the student, includes Reading, Writing, First Rudiments of Grammar, Arithmetic, History and Geography.

COMMERCIAL COURSE.

This course embraces the study of the English Language, History, Geography, Chronology, Mathematics, Book-Keeping, Banking, Commercial Law, Political Economy.

German, French, Telegraphy, and Stenography are optional studies.

Arithmetic, Fractions and Percentage receive particular attention.

The Commercial Course is generally completed in four years, after which the student may, if he wishes, apply himself to a more extended study of Mathematics and natural Sciences with the classical students.

FIRST YEAR.

SECOND YEAR.

English—Swinton's New Language Lessons; Epistolary Correspondence; Penmanship; Elocution; Essays; History of the United States—Hassard; Geography and Chronology; Arithmetic—Robinson's Higher; Book-Keeping—Bryant & Stratton; Christian Doctrine.

THIRD YEAR.

English—Swinton's Grammar and Composition; Principles of Style; Elocution; Essays; Penmanship; Ancient history—Fredet; Geography and Chronology; Algebra—Robinson; Book-Keeping—Bryant & Straton's Counting House; Commercial law; Christian Doctrine.

FOURTH YEAR.

English—Rhetoric—Quackenbos; Modern History—Fredet; Composition; Debates; Elocution; Geometry—Robinson; Banking; Business Customs; Commercial Law; Political Economy; Christian Doctrine.

CLASSICAL COURSE.

The first year of the Commercial Course is required as a preparation for the Classical Course. This course includes the English, Latin and Greek languages, Intellectual Philosophy, pure and mixed Mathematics and Natural Sciences. It is completed in seven years.

EXTRA.

The courses of German and French embrace the grammar, compositions and classes of these languages. The conversational method in use will soon familiarize the students with the difference of idioms. These studies are at the option of the students, and are free of charge.

The course in telegraphy is finished in one year. In this time

a student, with ordinary diligence and attention, acquires not only sufficient knowledge and experience to send telegrams with skill and accuracy—and receive by sound—but a full acquaintance with the details of the business practice, such as the fixing of batteries and the usual appurtenances of an office. Also optional.

There is a regular class in which the theory and practice of vocal music are taught, without charge, to all who show any aptitude or inclination thereto.

Instrumental music is optional.
